A Japanese Fighter Pilot Crash Lands on a Small Island

Fred Herbert, Regional Historian Emeritus of the Civil Air Patrol, will present an interesting and little known event that occurred after the Pearl Harbor bombardment on December 7, 1941. A Japanese fighter pilot crash-landed his disabled aircraft on a small island where pick up by a submarine was planned. The rescue submarine never arrived and the pilot, utilizing one of the aircraft's machine guns, dominated the people of the island. A local Japanese American whose actions led to the internment of Japanese Americans on the west coast of the United States assisted the pilot. Finally, a Hawaiian cowboy killed the pilot during a courageous attack. Over thirty-five slides are used, including photographs of the Island, the downed aircraft, etc.

Fred retired from Eastern Connecticut State University where he started as the Data Processing Director and retired as an Administrative Dean.

Diana Mason: I am originally from Russia and lived in an orphanage as the only black child. I was adopted in 2003 at the age of nine. I come from a family that is as diverse as it gets. My mother adopted me and seven other siblings from around the world. Three other children were adopted from Russia, two from Jamaica, and two from U.S. as well as her having two kids of her own. The reason why she adopted all of us is because she believed in giving us better lives and the colors of each person did not bother her at all because she saw more than just a color in each child and that is something very special. I had no education in Russia so when I first came to America I didn't know how to speak English or write, and it took me a while to learn. But, I definitely made it happen! Because as of right now I speak English fluently, write and read pretty well. I am a full time student at Three Rivers Community college and I truly enjoy it. Three Rivers is a great place for students like me. I can learn and do things to make myself and others proud. I love to be active around the campus because it helps me to become a stronger leader and I learn things from students.

I started mentoring in 2011 when I was a junior in High school. I was paired with a child who was blind, and who also had love for art. Being an art major myself, we had an instant connection, and our favorite time together was when we were in art. Working with this child gave me a strong sense of duty to my community. The following year after this experience, I started volunteering at local soup kitchens, helping with after school homework clubs, and I continued to mentor because I enjoyed it a lot. After graduating from Ledyard High school in 2012, I attended Three Rivers Community College. It is there that I really started to come into my own and understand more about mentoring and giving back to the community. I joined the F.E.M.A.L.E.S. Club (Females, Excelling, Maturing, Achieving, Leadership, Excellence and Success), which is a club that encourages to women to become female leaders. I was in the club for a short time when I was elected to my first position as the public relations officer. I had this position from 2012-2013. Then in the 2013-2014 school year I was elected as the Vice President of F.E.M.A.L.E.S. In addition to F.E.M.A.L.E.S., I was elected as the secretary of S.A.G.E., which stands for Students Advocating Gender Equality.

When women are in positions of power within an organization, they serve as strong role models for young girls. Women leaders also play an important

role in making sure that girls feel safe and that their needs are being met. Many coaches, teachers or trainers that are women have spoken to somebody and say that girls feel more comfortable sharing their needs to adults that are women. They are more comfortable talking to the same gender.

The committees of Membership, Publicity, and Cultural Interest had nothing to report.


