President's Message

Dear Ladies,



Happy Spring!!! I know the flowers and trees will bloom quickly and beautifully. As I'm sure you will agree, our February and March speakers were outstanding. Marti Bradshaw explained

how she and her husband, John had given countless hours volunteering with the Lakota Tribe in South Dakota. Marti's work should be an inspiration to all of us. We received a thank you from SIMPLY SMILE, INC. signed by Bryan Nurnberger, President and Founder, acknowledging our \$50 donation to be used wherever needed most on the Lakota Reservation. On Thursday night, March 14, Ann Shapiro, Musician and Storyteller, entertained us with American folk tales and hilarious stories. Ann is Director of Connecticut Storytellers

As you all know, I am totally interested in helping girls and women succeed in their educational pursuits. This month, I am writing about SOLVING THE EQUATION: The Variables for Women's Success in Engineering and Computing, which I copied from AAUW's website. SOLVING THE EQUATION asks why there are few women in the critical fields of engineering and computing—and explains what we can do to make these fields open to and desirable for female employees.

More than ever before girls are studying and excelling in science and mathematics. Yet the dramatic increase in girls' educational achievements in scientific and mathematical subjects has not been matched by similar increases in the representation of women working as engineers and computing professionals. Just 12% of engineers are women, and the number in computing has fallen from 35% in 1990 to just 26% today. The numbers are especially low for Hispanics and American Indian women. Black women make up 1% in the engineering workforce and 3% of the computing workforce, while Hispanic women hold just 1% of jobs in each field. American Indian and Alaska Native women make up just a fraction of a percent in each workforce.

So what is AAUW doing? AAUW has a long history of opening doors for women and girls in science, technology, engineering, and mathematics (STEM) from the classroom to Capitol Hill. The STEM fields are rapidly becoming the most indemand and lucrative in the world. The road ahead is very long, but AAUW has already seen progress. Change is possible for women through AAUW's proven resources, and they will continue to push for gender equity in their programs.

AAUW is offering Career Development Grants to women who hold a bachelor's degree and are pursuing to advance or change careers to reenter the workforce. Primary consideration is given to women of color and women pursuing their first advanced degree or credentials in nontraditional fields. SO HOPE AND HELP ARE ON THE WAY!!!

New London Branch AAUW Meeting Minutes March 14, 2019


