President's Message



Dear Ladies,

Several AAUW Board and Book Club members have been at our house, specifically Elizabeth & Kathy Hume & Jeanne OConnell. Some members have also ZOOMED in, and it's been a pleasure to see them. I want to thank Kim Blake for arranging our first ZOOM meeting regarding Food Insecurity and our September 9th event. Dr Joanne Moore discussed the History of the Women's Suffrage to celebrate the 19th Amendment "Giving" Women the Right to vote in 1920. Everyone attending appreciated Dr. Moore's presentation. A delicious meal was served followed by coffee and dessert.

In my previous Newsletters I have always focused on important issues that I have found on AAUW National's website. My October issue focuses on THE FUTURE OF WORK. Jobs of the future are changing rapidly—creating new opportunities and obstacles. We need to change policies and practices so women can thrive in the next generation workforce.

NOT YOUR MOTHER'S WORKFORCE. The nature of work—what we do and how and where we do it—is constantly evolving. The pace of change will only accelerate in the years ahead, presenting new opportunities and challenges for the workforce as a whole, but especially for women.

Technological advance—particularly automation and artificial intelligence—will diminish demand for certain jobs. Though women make up less than half of the overall workforce, research suggests women are 58% of workers at highest risk of losing their jobs to technology. On the other hand, these changes will also increase the need for other roles, most significantly in the STEM fields, where women are vastly underrepresented.

New workplace modes, such as telecommuting and gig economy could allow for greater flexibility to enable workers to find a better job-life blend. But the downsides include greater competition for certain roles and, for gig workers, the lack of stable wages and benefits that full-time employment provides.

Finally, tomorrow's workforce will be increasingly diverse, the byproduct of demographic shifts and a global economy. According to population analysis, by 2044 the full U.S. population will become "majority minority"—where the number of

individuals who are multiracial and racial and ethnic minorities exceeds those of whites.

The Board and I have met, and we have formulated some interesting programs via ZOOM. Highlights for October will be Lynn Fairfield-Sonn bringing news from the Red Cross; in November our own Cate Steel will tell us about events she encountered on the campaign trail; Emma Palzer Rae, an actress, will portray Victoria Woodhull in December. Emma's rendition will make you howl. In the meantime, stay safe and well and enjoy the changing leaves.

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AAUW Statement on the Passing of Supreme Couth Justice Ruth Bader Ginsburg

The following is a statement by AAUW CEO Kimberly Churches:



America lost one of our most beloved role models tonight, a pioneering jurist and iconic feminist who blazed new trails, not only in her own life, but in the lives of the countless women she championed-- and inspired. On behalf of AAUW

and its members and supporters who recognized Justice Ginsburg with a 1999 AAUW Achievement Award, we extend our condolences to her family, her colleagues and to every American whose lives and hearts she touched. The nation owes it to her--and to all women--to honor her final wishes and refrain from naming a replacement until after a new president is inaugurated.

It is with deep sorrow that I reach out this evening to share the news that Justice Ruth Bader Ginsburg '54 has passed away.

Justice Ginsburg, whose legal career in the fight for women's rights, equal rights and human dignity culminated with her ascent to the U.S. Supreme Court, died September 18 in Washington, D.C. She was 87.

"Ruth Bader Ginsburg was a true hero and a giant of American jurisprudence. A relentless champion of equity, she dedicated her life to innumerable, honorable causes, always fighting for what was right," said Cornell President Martha E. Pollack. "While the nation mourns her passing, we can find solace in the indelible imprint that she leaves on American society and on the lives of each of us who found inspiration from her actions and who will carry her spirit with us long into the future." Cate earned a Masters in Speech Pathology from the University of Nebraska at Omaha and completed her Educational Leadership (Sixth year degree) at Sacred Heart University in Connecticut.
